1. Call to Order. Co-Chair Colonel Nicholas DeAngelis, Department of Defense – ALCOM/J6, called the meeting to order at 1:30 p.m. Colonel DeAngelis requested that Ms. Mary Burnham read the roll, which she did, and she noted there was a quorum of Executive Council members present. Mr. Trygve Erikson, Mr. Paul Merkouris, and MSgt. Preston Fernandez joined the meeting after the roll was taken.

2. Opening Statements and Other Announcements. Colonel DeAngelis asked if there were any opening statements or other announcements. Hearing none, Colonel DeAngelis stated the council will now move on to the approval of the August meeting minutes.

3. Approval of Previous Meeting Minutes. Colonel DeAngelis asked the members if they had a chance to review the August minutes and if they had any requested changes at this time. None were offered and he requested that any of the other council members could please offer a motion by stating their name and a second by stating their name to approve the August meeting minutes.

Motion: Approve the August 6, 2025, Executive Council meeting minutes, as presented.

The motion was made by Director Bradley Wayland and seconded by Deputy Chief Gina Burlington. Colonel DeAngelis asked if there were any objections or further discussion, hearing none, **the motion was passed.**

4. Old Business.

a) State Interoperability Governing Body (SIGB). (**TABLED**) Colonel DeAngelis asked Mr. John Rockwell if there are any new updates on the SIGB.

Mr. Rockwell briefed that there were no updates, and he thinks that the default is going to come back to this group as far as looking at an interoperability governing body. He stated that he will start to work out how that might look and then bring it to the user council to bring it up to the executive body.

b) Long-term Cost Share Solution. (**TABLED**) Colonel DeAngelis asked Mr. Rockwell if there were any updates on this item.

Mr. Rockwell briefed that he did not have an update at this time. He stated the council has discussed, in the past, many different ideas, but none have stuck, so no new updates at this time.

Mr. Timothy (Tim) Woodall stated that he wanted to address Mr. Rockwell regarding the SIGB and asked Colonel DeAngelis if that would be okay.

Colonel DeAngelis stated that Mr. Woodall could proceed.

Mr. Woodall asked Mr. Rockwell if the SIGB is a state board, usually governed or appointed by the governor.

Mr. Rockwell stated that the original Administrative Order (AO) by Governor Walker was a state board. State interoperability was the focus and being a state board, the governor was going to designate it to that, if not expand outside of the state board. He noted that, basically, the board was for the state, except that it did include two ad hoc members, and therefore it was state centric. Mr. Rockwell commented that if the state can put it under the ALMR executive structure then they can truly look at it as a statewide interoperability governing body.

Mr. Woodall asked Mr. Rockwell if the governor, as Mr. Woodall understands from the Department of Homeland Security, where the SIGB concept originates, will have to appoint the Executive Council to operate as a SIGB, or is that something that the Executive Council can make a motion and do on their own. He noted that he is just trying to inform everyone at the meeting.

Mr. Rockwell stated that the executive body has the ability to create councils or committees. He noted that it is his vision that the ad hoc committee could represent what that concept of the committee is, so therefore it would not be a governor led committee, it would be through the ALMR Executive Council.

Mr. Woodall asked if it would be performing the role of a SIGB.

Mr. Rockwell stated that it would have some minimal limitations that the traditional SIGB would have, for example, a SIGB includes an ad hoc geographic information system (GIS) committee, which the ALMR Executive Council would not be able to perform. He commented that there are some nuances like that, but as far as looking at everything from interoperable communications, whether it has to do with spectrums, or whether it has to do with licenses, or that has to do with the direction of the committee, he believes that an ad hoc committee out of the Executive Council could suffice.

Mr. Woodall thanked Mr. Rockwell for that verification.

c) Intergovernmental Support Agreement (IGSA). Colonel DeAngelis asked Mr. Woodall if there were any updates to the Intergovernmental Support Agreement.

Mr. Woodall briefed that previously the Air Force had approved the authority and authorized the Air Force installations in Alaska that are ALMR member agencies to enter into an IGSA with the State of Alaska (SOA). He stated that the Army had to go through its own process and right at the beginning of October had approved that ability. Mr. Woodall noted that both the Army and Air Force ALMR member agencies in the state of Alaska are authorized to enter into an IGSA with the SOA to perform or to receive from the SOA as third-party beneficiaries, meaning they are not signatory to any contract, but they receive services, infrastructure operations management, and infrastructure

maintenance services from the SOA. He commented that it means that the SOA can contract on their behalf and the SOA can perform services related to operations management and infrastructure maintenance in support of ALMR for Department of Defense (DoD) installations that operate in that member agency. Mr. Woodall stated that the process now is that the state is reviewing both of those IGAs and once the state is done with their review, the state will then be pushing it through for signature. He noted that they hope that will be in the next two to six weeks, they were hoping the end of the month but with the furlough and certain things like that, he thinks on the Army side their coordination got slowed down a little bit, but hopefully by the first of December and no later than the end of the year, the DoD and SOA should have that IGA in place. Mr. Woodall commented that the IGA will require some modifications to some of the ALMR Cooperative and Mutual Aid agreement attachments, and addendums will have to go through the User Council and Executive Council to get those changes made in those documents, because those documents are referred to in the IGA and the DoD and SOA wants to make changes in the local documents and not in the IGA since it will be much easier to do it there. He stated that he was turning over the brief to Mr. Rockwell to see if he has any comments with regards to the state's timeline, but other than that, that is where they are at

Mr. Rockwell stated that the documents are currently sitting on his desk as what the SOA is considering a final draft to review, it is just the concept of allowing the state to procure services for the Army and Air Force is a little bit new. He noted they are reviewing the financial structure of how that would work. Mr. Rockwell asked Mr. Scott Stormo to assist with the terminology that means the state has to say they are going to spend this much money, but they do not get it in money, but they have the authority to spend a set amount.

Mr. Stormo stated that it is Fed Receipt Authority.

Mr. Rockwell noted that the state has to increase the Fed Receipt Authority to be able to do that and that it is currently being reviewed by the administrative officer to see what the ramifications would be. He commented that when he is done with his review, it will be run through the legal department for comments before its final signature by the commissioner of the Department of Public Safety (DPS).

d) TDMA versus Non-TDMA Inventory. Colonel DeAngelis asked Mr. Paul Fussey for an update on this item.

Mr. Fussey briefed that he has been reaching out to everybody, like he does every quarter, and ALMR has been getting more subscriber requests for radios that are being added that are TDMA and for radios to be removed. He stated that when he goes into his talking points a bit later, he will discuss this in more detail. Mr. Fussey noted that ALMR put out a training video on radio programming because what they see from the field is when they do turn on TDMA for the talkgroups, not all agencies have their radios properly programmed, so that is the one issue they are running into. He commented that they are making headway and progress with the larger agencies to have their radios upgraded to TDMA. Mr. Fussey stated that the small agencies are still looking for money

and that there is going to be a struggle for them in the near future. He noted that concludes his report.

e) Fairbanks Rabinowitz Courthouse Bidirectional Antenna (BDA). Colonel DeAngelis asked Mr. Rockwell if he had any updates to this item.

Mr. Rockwell briefed that they have put out the Rabinowitz Courthouse BDA in a proposal request and they have had multiple questions, so therefore they are going to be extending the date for responses and he does not have the date in front of him. He apologizes but said it will be within the next couple of weeks that they will have the responders get back to them. He noted that they will be doing a notice to proceed within a couple of weeks after that, so looking at the timeline, they will be moving forward with it by the end of the year.

f) Motorola Contract. Colonel DeAngelis asked Mr. Stormo for an update on this topic.

Mr. Stormo briefed that he met with one of the current providers and they have a meeting on November 6th or November 7th with them. He stated that Motorola is going to be up here for a few hours to give the Alaska Public Safety Communications Service (APSCS) a proposal and it is not a for sale proposal, but a proposal to kind of discuss the budgetary and what are their current offerings. Mr. Stormo noted that APSCS met with them in the last couple of weeks, where Motorola presented their current cyber offerings, which are different than what APSCS has under the current contract. He commented that what APSCS has under the current contract is only partially available, the patching part, not the monitoring part, which the security monitoring does not exist anymore for sale from Motorola. Mr. Stormo stated that it is a managed detect and response they are offering now, so on November 6th APSCS will expect to see some initial pricing for that and then that will kind of begin the discussion and dialogue with them for a follow up contract. He asked if there were any questions.

Colonel DeAngelis stated that there were no questions, and that the final item of old business was the Tudor Road electrical work.

g) Tudor Road Electrical Work. Colonel DeAngelis asked Mr. Stormo if he had any updates.

Mr. Stormo briefed that this has finally been successfully completed, and like all projects that start off with something small but turned into something much bigger. He stated that the Tudor Road site ended up with a modernized transformer installed by Chugach Electric, and there is good commercial power service to the building. Mr. Stormo noted that the building did not have any issues during the generator cutover, and that the building ran fine on batteries and generators while it had lost commercial power for the short time during the cutover. He commented that everything is working fine, and it is completed at this point.

Colonel DeAngelis asked if anyone had any questions or comments on any of the old business items.

Mr. Fussey asked Mr. Stormo if he approved removing the Tudor Road Electrical Work item from old business, Mr. Stormo approved. Mr. Fussey then asked if Colonel DeAngelis had any reservations about removing item "g" from the old business, and Colonel DeAngelis stated he had no objections.

Colonel DeAngelis stated that having completed old business he asked Mr. Scott Nelsen or Ms. Tammy Goggia-Cockrell to please update the council on the User Council.

5. User Council Update.

Mr. Scott Nelsen briefed that he only has two items, and the first item is that the User Council is still seeking alternate members for the Southeast and the Federal Non-DoD Department of the Interior (DOI) representatives, again those are alternates. He stated that the second item is that he has been talking about what needed to be done or what the user council should do regarding some members who have been absent chronically, for more than five months. Mr. Nelsen noted that the decision has been to send a memo to them reminding them of their membership obligations. He commented that was all he had.

Colonel DeAngelis asked if there were any questions for Mr. Nelsen at this point.

6. Operations Management Office.

Colonel DeAngelis asked Mr. Fussey to please provide the Operations Management Office (OMO) update.

Mr. Fussey started by asking on behalf of Ms. Burnham for the roll call, who a specific phone number was, and Mr. Trygve Erikson with the Municipality of Anchorage responded it was him. Mr. Fussey thanked Mr. Erikson and moved onto his updates.

a) Training and Outreach. Mr. Fussey briefed that Mr. Dan Nelson has posted a TDMA programming training video. because when ALMR started turning on TDMA for some groups, there were some programming issues. Mr. Fussey noted that ALMR recommends that everybody take a look at that video. Currently there are 42 training videos broken down into 5 categories on our website <https://alaskalandmobileradio.org/training-videos-2/>.

Mr. Fussey stated that all membership agreements have been signed, finalized, and they have been sent back to the member agencies, so that is now completed. He noted that usually the OMO is working on this until the November/December timeframe, so it is very encouraging to have everything done and completed at this time of the year.

Mr. Fussey noted that he attended the Alaska Digital Government Summit that was held in Anchorage on 9 October, and some of the key topics were cybersecurity, digital

transformation, AI implementation, and data governance. He commented that he met with several agencies after that from the city and the federal representatives on Federal Risk and Authorization Management Program (FedRAMP) and how it affects some of the other individuals for their radios and what systems they want to use, so it was really productive.

Mr. Fussey commented that the security team completed their inspection of the ALMR system.

Mr. Fussey briefed that the ALMR Insider newsletter was sent out on 15 October, so the hard copies were mailed out; Ms. Burnham posted it on the website and emailed it out to everyone on the distribution groups including the User Council and Executive Council; and then hard copies were mailed to the legislatures in Washington, DC.

Mr. Fussey stated that he has been attending the monthly APOA meetings, that is the Alaska Police Officers Association, and they have had really good discussions and guest speakers from Western States Information Network (WISN) and also from Anchorage Police Department (APD). They have been very good speakers and discussions.

Mr. Fussey noted that he has been sending out emails to agencies regarding their subscriber numbers. If everyone remembers, ALMR is allowed 33,000 subscriber units on the system, and when he gets in the metrics here in a little bit, everyone will see that ALMR went over that number. He commented that he has been extremely proactive in sending out emails to member organizations and groups to remove those radios they are not being used and ALMR is now below that number. He stated that he is glad everyone has helped by submitting subscribe requests.

Mr. Fussey commented that this is similar to what Mr. Rockwell was talking about with the bi-directional amplifiers (BDAs) and the distributed antenna systems (DAS), so he attended the BDA/DAS seminar, which was sponsored by the Safer Building Coalition in Anchorage on 25 September with Mr. Stormo and other install representatives. He stated that the focus was on the changes to the NFPA, which is the National Fire Protection Association, and IFC, which is International Fire Codes. Mr. Fussey noted that he compiled his notes, made a PowerPoint presentation, and sent it out to the state and local fire marshals. He commented that the Safer Building Coalition has submitted several changes that they want for the BDAs and DAS systems to get more control over them, so that will be interesting if they do get approved.

Mr. Fussey briefed that Ms. Burnham is working on the renewal of the ALMR website that is completed every three years, so Wostmann and Associates is working on that.

Mr. Fussey stated that the cost share amounts, all of them, have been submitted to Ms. Terri Warren except for two, which are scheduled for payment after the government shutdown is completed. It is really nice to have that done because that is always a little stressful to have that money out there not being paid. He noted that he appreciates everyone for closing out the costshare amounts to Ms. Warren.

Mr. Fussey noted that he, Mr. Nikalus (Nik) Fahnestock, and his team have worked with the Matanuska-Susitna (Mat-Su) Borough radio shop and turned on TDMA for all their talkgroups and have not heard of any issues with them. He stated that Mr. Zack McRae, his team, and Mr. Casey Cook, who ALMR worked with, have been monitoring it on our zone control board. Mr. Fussey noted that ALMR can see they are talking in TDMA, so that has been very encouraging, and then ALMR worked with Mr. Jim Goodman and turned TDMA on all the talkgroups of the City of Palmer PD, and ALMR is watching monitoring the talkgroups. He commented that it has been very encouraging, which is helping out and reducing the number of busies, so there are a large number of the agencies for the Mat-Su Borough that are now TDMA.

Mr. Fussey commented that ALMR received a request from the Anchorage Wide Area Radio Network (AWARN) team, so he, Mr. Fahnestock, and Mr. Patrick Thornton from the APSCS office had a meeting with the University of Alaska Anchorage (UAA) Police Chief and their lead dispatcher to talk and discuss installing a BDA at their Mat-Su Borough campus and other radio/BDA options. He stated that the UAA police operate in 700/800 megahertz on the AWARN system because their major backup is APD, however, they have been tasked with putting officers out in the small satellite campuses, for example, the one in the Mat-Su Borough, which is at the very extent of the range for 700/800 megahertz. Mr. Fussey noted that they do not have any issues outside the buildings, but inside the buildings they do not have any radio communications. He, Mr. Fahnestock, and Mr. Thornton talked with them about the BDA systems for that campus and also possibly a multi-band radio, which is VHS and 700/800 megahertz, this was a productive meeting with them.

b) Project Status Update. Mr. Fussey briefed that on September 8th, the generator backup system was tested at the Zone Two Master Site with no interruptions to ALMR observed, plus ALMR did not get any complaints from any of the system our users up there.

Mr. Fussey stated that APSCS and ALMR are still meeting regularly with Motorola regarding closing out the upgrade projects similar to what Mr. Stormo talked about earlier.

Mr. Fussey noted that the FY27 OMO/SMO, which is the System Management Office, Operating Budget document was completed, approved by the User Council and Executive Council, and was submitted to Mr. Stormo.

Mr. Fussey asked if there were any questions before he goes to the metrics, hearing none, he continued.

c) September system metrics. Mr. Fussey briefed that the monthly group and individual calls for September were 1,541,849; the monthly push-to-talks were 2,455,615; and the busies were 364. He stated that the sites below three nines, there were six of them. There were some power issues with Hill 3265 and Quarry Hill, which are connected, and there were commercial circuit issues at High Mountain, Pillar Mountain, Sunnahae, and Women's Bay. Mr. Fussey asked if there were any questions

on those before he goes to the subscriber counts, and Mr. Woodall asked if the issues have been resolved, which Mr. Fussey responded in the affirmative that those have been resolved.

Mr. Fussey stated that when the group starts looking at the ALMR subscriber counts by the agencies, the SOA for Zone One and Zone Two, and then of course Zone Four, which is the Municipality of Anchorage (MOA). That is the 700/800 megahertz range so they are the only one in Zone Four. He noted that if the group looks at the August number, which was 33,036, ALMR exceeded our 33,000 amount, so he has been extremely proactive talking to individuals, sending emails out, which he thanked to Mr. Fahnestock and his team for getting him the Excel spreadsheet. That way he can break down the numbers and let people know what radios have not been on the system for at least three years. Mr. Fussey commented that there are other radios, and he encourages agencies, if they have not used them in a while, to turn them on, put them on an ALMR channel, press the push-to-talk button or key them up, however each agency wants to use the terminology. He briefed that a lot of subscriber requests have come in and that number has dropped back down to 32,812, but the team is still working on reducing that number. Mr. Fussey stated that he still has some more agencies to talk to, and he started talking to Arcticom, ProComm, and Revl Communications, because they do a lot of the programming for the agencies and help to turn in subscriber requests. He noted that he is very pleased that ALMR is below that 33,000 number, and he still has a lot of work to do.

Mr. Fussey asked if there were any questions about the metrics.

d) Other. Mr. Fussey briefed that on the ALMR website the amount of sessions is up 12% and that is very encouraging because when he is talking to all these agencies, he has been directing them to the website for the training videos, and the approved equipment list. The team was talking to a couple of other agencies that are looking to buy new TDMA radios, so the team walked them through which equipment has been approved and where the hyperlinks are and stuff like that. He stated that it is very encouraging that ALMR is getting more use out of our website.

Mr. Fussey stated that, as Mr. Nelson mentioned earlier, that the OMO has been actively looking for some folks for the user council, however, the OMO does have a possible Alaska Municipal League (AML) representative for the Executive Council, and the OMO is waiting to receive a nomination letter from that individual, which Ms. Burnham is working on.

Mr. Fussey noted that he traveled up to the Zone Two Master Site in Fairbanks from September 15th to the 17th, and he conducted his inspection of the backups and maintenance of the system. He commented that he does that here in Zone One monthly, but Zone Two, he gets there twice a year making sure that the Key Management Facility (KMF) backups are being done and the Network Attached Storage (NAS) backups are being done. Mr. Fussey briefed that while he was up there, he did deliver the external hard drive to the Motorola technician to use for the NAS external backups and per the

policies and procedures that is to be done weekly, but he brought up another external backup hard drive for them so they can do that.

Mr. Fussey commented that during his trip to Fairbanks, he met with members of different agencies in person, for example, Fairbanks Fire Department; University of Alaska Fairbanks Fire Department and Police Department; Tri-Valley Volunteer Fire Department in Healy; and Anderson Volunteer Fire Department. He stated that while he was meeting with the Tri-Valley and Anderson fire chiefs, he went and looked at their radios, talked to them about their programming, and Mr. Fussey and Mr. Fahnestock turned on TDMA for their Denali Borough Fire talkgroup. Mr. Fussey noted that some testing was done while he was there at Anderson and the radios worked well with TDMA, and Mr. Fahnestock could see that they were transmitting in TDMA. However, one of their major mutual aid groups called Mr. Fahnestock the next day and said they were unable to talk to them, and they were unable to hear Fairbanks dispatch. He commented that is where the team found the problem and Mr. Fahnestock did a phenomenal job helping that group to find the programming of their radios was wrong for TDMA. Mr. Fussey stated that the team turned TDMA back off for them and the SMO was working with that agency. They are almost done reprogramming their radios, so once their radios have been programmed correctly, ALMR will turn TDMA back on for those groups. He noted that he is also working with Capital City Transit to turn on TDMA for their radios, they are on ALMR, and all the radios are TDMA compliant, so hopefully due to the holiday tomorrow, by Monday or Tuesday next week, ALMR will have TDMA turned on for Capital City Transit.

Mr. Fussey briefed that he attended the Juneau flooding after action report (AAR) in September and he did answer some ALMR radio questions. He stated that ALMR did not see any spike in busies or other issues during the flooding and the ALMR towers were not in the flood zone.

Mr. Fussey stated that the Alaska Federation of Natives (AFN) convention is being held in Anchorage, the 16th to the 18th, and then also the International Association of Chiefs of Police (IACP) is going to be in Denver coming up October 18th to the 21st.

Mr. Fussey noted that for the User Council in October is the beginning of the annual election process of User Council Chair and Vice-Chair positions, so Ms. Burnham is working with the individuals for nominations and then the voting occurs in November.

Mr. Fussey commented that is all he has pending any questions.

Colonel DeAngelis asked if anyone had any questions for Mr. Fussey on any of these items, hearing none, he continued.

7. New Business.

Colonel DeAngelis asked if anyone had any new business items that they would like to offer up for the good of the group.

Mr. Woodall stated that he has two items he would like to brief and the first one relates to a look at the system from a cyber perspective that was conducted, which there were a number of findings, and those findings are being examined and rectified through a Plan of Action and Milestones (POAM) process through the risk management framework perspective. He noted that it was good, and the team was able to secure the system a little tighter than it was before, which is a good thing. Mr. Woodall commented that he knows that the council had brought up that it was going to be looked at, but he wanted to close that out, so this is not a new item, it is just an update and a close out on that cyber look.

Mr. Woodall noted that the second thing is that he and Mr. Stormo have been dealing with the tower issues on the DoD installations. The SOA has through the Frequency Sharing Agreement that the National Telecommunications Information Administration through the United States (US) Department of Commerce and the Federal Communications Commission (FCC) signed authorizes the SOA to put frequencies on DoD towers. He commented that, typically, the FCC requires that when agencies put frequencies on the tower, that the tower is registered under the federal rules for spectrum management tower registration, which is not required/enforced on DoD installations. Mr. Stormo has been working some time with the public works and CE organizations on the installations, trying to get them to register those towers. Mr. Woodall stated that is not going to happen, so he and Mr. Stormo have worked out an agreement that the DoD will do a memo stating that they are the owners of the towers and that the State of Alaska has authorization through an FCC waiver to operate the frequencies on those towers, but they are not the owner of the tower and that becomes important if other agencies want to put things on the tower. He noted that they have been calling the state if a tower light is out, and they are expecting the state to repair the tower instead of the owner of the tower, so they will resolve that. Mr. Woodall commented that it is just for information, and asked Mr. Stormo if he had anything to add.

Mr. Stormo responded that essentially they are still going to look in the intent of structuring registration databases belonging to the SOA, but they will have documentation to explain what this gray area that APSCS lives in by having this combined system, so if GCI or somebody wants to put cellular equipment on one of those towers, the rules say they have got to be engaging with the SOA to put that on the tower, but the state will have an explanation as to why they need to go to the right people and the state will know who the right people are.

Mr. Woodall stated that was all he had pending any questions.

Colonel DeAngelis stated that nothing was heard.
